New technology makes wallpaper an easier choice

If you're planning to install wallpaper yourself, but aren't sure what type to buy, Bill Burget, executive vice president with DL Couch Wallcovering in Noblesville, Ind., offers this advice: "Every roll of wall covering has a set of instructions. Read them carefully and follow them to the letter." Here are a few other terms to help you

- navigate the selections: ► Strippable nonwoven: A combination of wood (pulp) fibers and synthetic that is both durable and strippable. Good for all rooms in
- the house. Paper-backed vinyl/solidsheet vinyl: A layer of paper laminated to a laver of vinyl. It's durable and

scrubable (more durable than a washable wall covering). Good for bathrooms and kitchens.

Specialty wall coverings: Flocked wallpaper (made by a machine that shakes very fine cotton, silk, rayon and nylon fibers to give the appearance of velvet or damask); natural fibers (vines, jute, sea grass, wool, linen, silk, cotton that are dyed and laminated to a backing); exotic enhancements (glass beads, sand and cork sifted onto the decorative side of the wall covering). These coverings are good for formal rooms with limited traffic, such as offices and dining rooms.
